Questions:

- 1. Identify and explain one example of a metaphor used in the poem.
- 2. Find a simile in the poem. What is being compared, and what effect does it create?
- 3. Describe the imagery in the lines: "And looked down one as far as I could / To where it bent in the undergrowth." What picture does it create in your mind?
- 4. What mood or feeling does the poem evoke in you? Provide specific lines or words that contribute to this mood.
- 5. What is the tone of the speaker in the last stanza? How does it differ from the tone in the earlier stanzas?
- 6. How might the poem relate to the idea of individuality and forging one's own path?
- 7. What do you think the poem suggests about making choices in life?
- 8. Have you ever faced a significant choice in your life where you had to decide between two different paths? How did you feel at that time? Did you relate to the speaker's dilemma in the poem?
