Questions:

- 3. Discuss the symbolism of the bells in the poem. What might they represent?
- 4. Identify instances of imagery in the poem. How do these images create a vivid picture in the reader's mind?
- 5. How does the mood of the poem change as different aspects of life are addressed? Describe the emotions the poem conveys to the reader.
- 6. Analyze the symbolism of ringing out the old and ringing in the new. What might these phrases symbolize in the context of the poem?
- 7. How do you personally interpret the message of the poem, especially regarding the transition from the old year to the new year?
