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Questions:

- 1. Who is the child mentioned in the poem, and what does he ask the speaker to do?
- 2. What is the speaker describing in the poem?
- 3. Discuss the significance of the child's request to the speaker to "Pipe a song about a Lamb!" How does this request contribute to the poem's theme?
- 4. Identify instances of imagery in the poem. How do these images create a vivid picture in the reader's mind?
- 5. How does the act of writing with a "rural pen" and staining the water clear symbolize purity and innocence in the context of the poem?
- 6. How does the rhyme scheme contribute to the rhythm and flow of the poem?
- 7. Can you relate the experience of the speaker with the child and the lamb to a specific moment in your life? Explain your connection.
- 8. Why do you think the child asks the speaker to pipe a song about a lamb specifically? What might this choice signify about the child's innocence and imagination?
