Questions:

- 5. How does the mood of the poem change throughout? Describe the emotions the poem evokes in the reader.
- 6. Analyze the symbolism of the lapwing in the poem. What might it represent or symbolize?
- 7. How do you personally relate to the feelings of loss and anguish expressed in the poem?
- 8. Why do you think the poet chose a lapwing as a central element in this poem? What might be the cultural or literary significance of this choice?
