Excerpt: From "Great Expectations" by Charles Dickens

"Are you familiar yet with the name of any one in the family, Estella?"

When I have realized my sins I can afford to be more pitiful. Now, tremble, for I must warn you that you will be contaminated by my experience. You will share my abhorrence of the destiny into which I have fallen."
